Paul Iglinski and the rest of the handicap/rules committee are working on a solution – we'll have that out to


the membership once we discuss the matter with Kevin and Matte.

Ready Golf means THINK-ING AHEAD so that you're ready to play when its your turn. It means BEING ready to play, not playing when you're ready. Here is a summary:

- walk to your ball as soon as possible, so that you can choose your club and think about your shot in advance (don't wait until it's your turn to do this)
- if you drive a cart, drop off your partner first, let them select their club(s) and then drive to your own ball to get **READY** to play
- if someone in your foursome loses a ball, hit your own shot FIRST and then help to look for the lost ball
- walk down the SIDES of the fairway to reach your ball





Ready Golf continued:

- don't play as a "caravan", moving in a group from ball to ball
- on the green, line up your putt **BEFORE** its your turn and putt out immediately (instead of marking) if you are not in someone else's line
- on the tee, Ready Golf means that the player with honors should be READY to HIT FIRST - only if they aren't should someone else tee up first
- Ready Golf means ALL golfers should go to their ball as soon as possible (as long as it's safe) and get READY to play their shot



Dems Da Rules

Camilo Villegas, at the Hyundai Tournament of Champions, tried chipping his ball onto the 15th green, for the second time. Casually, he flicked away a small piece of debris near his divot as his ball rolled back down the slope towards him. That was a violation of Rule 23-1, which states that, "When a ball is in motion, a loose impediment that might influence the movement of the ball must not be removed." http://www. youtube.com/watch?v=YSWAJiH3yeI

Villegas recorded a double bogey 7 for the hole, but did not add in the 2 stroke penalty for the rule violation on his signed scorecard. After a television viewer noticed the violation, it was brought to the attention of the tournament rules officials. After viewing the video replay, Villegas graciously acknowledged that this was a clear rules violation and accepted the DQ for the incorrectly signed scorecard. It was his 29th birthday. Like it or not, the Rules of Golf are the rules.

No one will be following you around Victoria with a video camera this season. But the golf we play is governed by the same set of rules that the pros observe, with a few exceptions. The rules are often wacky, but we are expected to know them and impose penalties upon ourselves when they are broken, even if we didn't correctly understand them before they were brought to our attention. It's not hockey.

Without becoming too anally retentive, here are a few things that we expect you to know and observe during club play.

In stroke play competition, every green is holed out. If you miss a 2-inch putt with the back of

your putter, take another stroke at it after the ball comes to rest. You are not likely to do that very often if you count the strokes. Your opponent in match play can concede holes and putts. But if you are playing a match on Men's Night, putt out for your stroke play score. We know that it is not kosher to combine stroke and match play, but most of us have day jobs.

- Hit a provisional ball anytime you feel your ball might be lost. If you lose a ball and have not played a provisional, your only option for a legitimate score on that hole is to go back to where you played your last shot and take a drop for a one stroke penalty. The group behind you and your playing partners will not be happy waiting for you to do this. To avoid their abuse, consider taking an X on the hole and finishing the round for fun and handicapping purposes. With an X on your scorecard, you are not eligible for low net/gross prizes, but the round must be entered for your handicap.
- The cricket pitch on the left of #9 is OB. Lately, it has not been indicated by white stakes, but a line is usually apparent to define the boundary. If all of your ball lies outside the line, it is OB. Again, the only option is another shot, most probably from the tee. Always hit a provisional here if you are in doubt. Remember that if there is ever a hazard or OB marked with both stakes and a line, the stakes indicate the area while the line defines it.
- The parking area, its access road, and River Road are also OB if they come into play.




Da Rules...Continued

- The new maintenance building to the right of the 4th tee is going to be a magnet for many of us. Our intention is to get the area marked as a lateral hazard so that wayward shots there do not cause undue delay. A lost ball or nasty lie in that hazard would be remedied by a drop at the point of entry, with a one stroke penalty. A provisional ball would not be needed for a ball hit into the hazard.
- When in doubt of a rule, advise your playing partners that you are playing a second ball under Rule 3-3 and announce which ball you wish to use if the Rules permit. Report the facts of the situation to the Rules Committee before returning your scorecard.
- You are responsible for the correctness of your handicap, hole scores, gross score, and net score on the scorecard that is turned in. You are not eligible for net score prizes if you entered a higher course handicap than you actually have. Promptly enter all your

scores on all the rated courses that you have played into the RCGA Handicap System and be aware of your current handicap. Do not confuse your handicap factor (which has one decimal place) with your course handicap (a whole number that depends on the course and tee you are playing from). It is your course handicap at Victoria that is used for net scores and match play competitions. It also determines your flight for the Ringer Board and the Club Championship



Ready Golf continued:

- always leave your clubs to the side or back of the green, closest to the next tee
- don't stand around chatting and writing down scores while on the green
- Ready Golf means putting CONTINUOUSLY until you hole out (if you're not in someone else's line and you don't need to spend a lot of time surveying your shot)
- use a common sense approach to "Farthest from the Hole": for example, if you are carting and get to your ball long before your (walking) playing partners, hit your shot first even if you're not away

The top 8 golfers in the two round combined low gross score qualifying rounds will become the 8 qualifiers for the interclub team. More often than not, some members of the team won't be able to make it out for every interclub match and we'll require alternates to fill in for them.

IMPORTANT NOTE

(new bylaw): To be considered and chosen as an alternate, you MUST have played in BOTH qualifying rounds.

Now for another change that's likely to apply this season. I was at an EGA meeting in February and there were a couple changes and clarifications to interclub for the 2011 season. The one main point that affects you is that interclub will likely move from morning tee times to sometime around noon. The Gibson clan, for one, is very excited to have a few more hours of sleep/practice/warm-up in before we do battle against some of the best golfers this city has to offer.

Well that's about it. I can't wait for the season to start and I know it's a sentiment that's shared. I'm sure I've shared a round or a beer/rum with most of you by now, but I'm looking forward to meeting the new faces this year. Remember that one of the best ways to get to know your fellow Club members is through the tournaments and singles and doubles match play.
